Fleet Management Launches Automation Project to Reduce Costs and Improve Efficiency

The Fleet Management Division (FMD) has launched a fleet efficiency project that will enable the organization to automate its vehicle rental pool, reduce inventory of underutilized vehicles, and significantly reduce costs.

The state is working with Agile Fleet to implement its new FleetCommander information system. Agile Fleet is a fleet management solutions company that serves the government, university, utility, and commercial sectors, allowing them to collect vehicle usage data needed to identify underutilized vehicles, adjust vehicle types needed by drivers, and right-size its fleet. Agile Fleet estimates a savings of \$3,500 to \$6,000 per

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PEIA Hosts Annual Benefit Fairs Via Conference Calls

As a part of the open enrollment period for Plan Year 2022, the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) is hosting benefit fairs for its members via conference calls. The calls will allow attendees to ask questions and learn more about benefit plans while keeping members and employees safe. Representatives from PEIA, the Health Plan, FBMC, Humana, and Securian will be on hand during the conference calls to answer questions.

Open enrollment allows eligible employees to change their health plan; add, drop, or change coverage for themselves and their dependents; and make changes to their Mountaineer Flexible Benefits. Open enrollment for Plan Year 2022 is scheduled for April 2, 2021, through May 15, 2021. Changes to benefits can be made online by clicking on the green "Manage My Benefits" button on the PEIA website at *peia.wv.gov* or by requesting a transfer form by phone at 1.877.676.5573. Open enrollment changes for Plan Year 2022 must be completed by 11:00 p.m. on May 15, 2021, and become effective July 1, 2021.

A brief explanation of plan changes will be given at the beginning of each conference call, followed by questions from participants. Two GSD Employees Earn National Certification

If the West Virginia State Capitol campus looks extra nice this spring, it could be thanks to two General Services Division (GSD) employees who just earned their certificates from the Certified Grounds Technician (CGT) program offered by the Professional Grounds Management Society (PGMS). Carles Farley and Eric Pardue both earned the designation of CGT professional after meeting extensive requirements that included a comprehensive examination by the PGMS.

Farley, who is the grounds supervisor, has more than 21 years of public service with GSD while Pardue has been with GSD for nearly two years. Both Farley and Pardue perform lawn and landscape maintenance, handle seasonal plantings, perform snow removal, remove refuse and debris from the property, and decorate the campus at Christmas and during other special events throughout the year.

"This certification has helped build my professional credibility and given me the skills and knowledge I need to do my job better," said Farley. "It sets me apart as a leader in my industry."

As part of the program, Farley and Pardue learned about tree and shrub management, including pruning, water management, and fertilization, as well as relevant information on flowers, soil, fertilizers, and best practices for sustainable landscaping. The examination administered by PGMS contained 50 questions and required a passing score of 80%. Pardue said GSD has afforded him the opportunity to advance his education and knowledge as a groundskeeper. "Acquiring my CGT certification will assist me in my duties in helping to keep the capitol grounds looking their very best, which is something I take great pride in," he said.

Agencies Invited to Participate in 2021 Session of the Governor's Internship Program

It's that time of year again! West Virginia state agencies are encouraged to consider hosting an intern this summer through the 2021 Governor's Internship Program. Hosts of the Governor's Internship Program must apply at *www.intern*. wv.gov/Pages/Host.aspx. Once they have applied, they will get access to a database of college students who have a 3.0+ GPA, have completed at least one year of undergraduate study and are West Virginia residents attending a college/university in or out



of state.

Hosts will be responsible for interviewing and selecting their own intern(s). This process ensures that each agency can select an intern whose skills best fit the needs of the position and the agency. Host agencies must pay interns at least minimum wage and give them meaningful work assignments related to their field of study. Interns generally work for nine to 13 weeks throughout the summer. Outside of state government, nonprofits and private businesses may host interns as well.



How to React When Your Car Starts to Skid

No matter how good a driver you think you are, there will be times when your perceptions and skills are put to the test. At no time is this more prevalent than when your car starts to skid. There is little that can compare with the realization that your 2,000-pound vehicle is no longer under your control. While it is true that you can go into a skid at any time, the chances dramatically increase during inclement weather. The Fleet Management Division would like to offer the following advice on how to react in such an event.

Unfortunately, not everyone knows how to properly react when entering a skid (or fishtail). Instead of panicking, take a deep breath. This should help you control your reflexes enough to keep yourself from overreacting.

There are two different types of skids: front wheel and rear wheel. A front wheel skid occurs when the entire car starts drifting in a direction other than the driver's intended course. This type of skid tends to occur when a driver enters a curve too quickly. If your car enters a front wheel skid,



ease off the accelerator. If you are driving a car with a manual transmission, depress the clutch. Keep your eyes focused on a target ahead of you and try to steer the car back on course. If you don't regain control of the car within 2-3 seconds, then depress the brake lightly. Braking will help to transfer power to the front of the car. Braking too suddenly, however, can cause the wheels to lock, which will make the skid worse.

A rear wheel skid occurs when the back end of the car slides out to the right or left. This is also known as "fishtailing." At some point, someone has probably told you to "turn into the skid." However, this advice can be misleading. Say that the back end of your car suddenly slides out to the right. You don't want to turn your wheel sharply to the right as well, especially if you are traveling at a high rate of speed. You want to turn to the right just enough to straighten out the car. Focusing on a target in the distance will help prevent you from "over-correcting." As you turn, slowly ease off the accelerator. Avoid the temptation to brake suddenly.

Finally, there are a few tips to consider when trying to prevent skids:

- Make sure your tires have adequate tread. Tires are made with a "wear bar" in the treads. If the level of the tire reaches that of the "wear bar," it is time to get new tires. You can also check your tires by inserting a penny into the tread upside-down. Lincoln's head should be partially covered.
- Drive slowly in wet, icy, or snowy conditions.
- Keep an appropriate distance between you and the car ahead of you. A general rule of thumb is four car lengths for every 10 mph. This way, you will have plenty of time to react if the driver in front of you stops. Trying to stop too suddenly can cause a skid.
- Slow down before entering a curve or bend. Taking a curve too quickly or braking too suddenly while going around a bend can cause skids.

vehicle in maintenance, depreciation, insurance, parking, and other costs related to fleet management for every vehicle that is removed from the fleet.

"The state of West Virginia has solved the inventory issue and is currently focusing on utilization. Once FMD gets the FleetCommander kiosk system installed, the program will be used to share vehicles across agencies reducing the number of pool vehicles, thus saving monies for the taxpayers of our state," said FMD Director Kenny Yoakum. "We are looking forward to automating our motor pool and expanding to other state departments so they too can achieve savings and efficiencies."

The automated system will enable the Fleet Management Division to:

- Offer employees the convenience of reserving vehicles online remotely and accessing keys via an attendant-free kiosk and key control system located in Charleston, with a potential roll-out across the state.
- Eliminate arduous manual and paper processes for managing shared vehicles.
- Collect vehicle usage data needed to identify underutilized vehicles, adjust vehicle types needed by drivers, and right-size the fleet.
- Efficiently communicate and enforce state fleet policies automatically as people interact with the system.
- Rotate vehicles based on mileage to spread usage evenly among vehicles.
- Pave the way for more efficient use of state vehicles for future departments as they gain access to the self-service motor pool.

All state departments will be eligible to join the motor pool. The Agile Fleet system is already in place at West Virginia's Department of Health and Human Resources.

Master Painter Honored for Six Decades of Craftsmanship, Preservation of the Capitol Building

Over the course of its 89 years, the West Virginia capitol has undergone several major paint restoration projects, and master painter Richard Withrow of the W.Q. Watters Company has performed or supervised work on nearly every one of those projects.

In recognition of his personal contributions over the last six decades to the restoration of the West Virginia capitol, including the current restoration project anticipated for completion in Spring 2021, Gov. Jim Justice has given Mr. Withrow the Distinguished Mountaineer Award.

Mr. Withrow's life and career has intertwined and matured alongside the capitol. In 1960, only 23 years after the dedication of the capitol, Mr. Withrow picked up a paintbrush as an apprentice painter with W.Q. Watters Company and soon after found himself working on the restoration of the exterior dome, marking the beginning of his experience with the state capitol. By 1996, as a master painter and foreman, he was supervising the restoration of the interior rotunda, replicating the color and details of the original decorative paint.

Over the years, Mr. Withrow has touched nearly every inch of the capitol, from painting corridors and offices to restoring the paint in the Supreme Court of Appeals and both the Senate and House Chambers. He also supervised the exterior renovation of the Governor's Mansion, which was completed in 2020, and is supervising its interior renovation this spring.

In the current restoration project of the capitol, Mr. Withrow has overseen and trained other painters in replicating historic methods of painting and glazing the inner dome, rotunda, and the exterior dome. He has developed countless samples and techniques to match more than 20 different finishes in the building.

Accessing the restoration work for the current project required a 234-foot climb to the top of the scaffolding multiple times per day, a remarkable feat for a man in his 80s, and that fact testifies to Mr. Withrow's dedication, professionalism, and passion for the capitol.

To commemorate his personal service and as representative of the countless tradesmen and women who have constructed and preserved the state's iconic state capitol, Mr. Withrow inscribed his signature next to that of the original painters, hidden from view on an ornamental plaster cornice feature but not forgotten to history.

Registration **Now Open** for May 13 Mandatory Training Webinar for **High-Level** Officials

Registration is now open for the State Officials' Purchasing Procedures and Purchasing Card Rules training, co-presented by the West Virginia Purchasing Division and the State Auditor's Office. This two-hour session, scheduled for May 13, 2021, will be conducted online as a webinar. Offered twice a year, this training is mandatory for high-level state officials as indicated in W. Va. Code §5A-3-60.

The Code requires all highlevel state officials to annually complete two hours of training on purchasing procedures and purchasing card processes. Space is limited to the first 100 people to register. To register for this live webinar, view the instructions contained online at www.state.wv.us/ admin/purchase/training/ mandatory.html.

Following the webinar, the recording will be posted in CourseMill. Instructions on how to view the recording following the webinar are also posted at the link above.
