# WVOT Collaboration Creates Faster Network Speed, Better Access for State Libraries

A joint effort between the state's Library Commission and the West Virginia Office of Technology (WVOT), with assistance from the state's central Purchasing Division, has led to significant improvements to the State Library Network's (SLN) broadband services. The collaboration gives West Virginians better access to resources at libraries across the state.

The SLN serves 144 libraries, each of which received increased internet connection speeds at an average of 900% faster as part of the project.

Library Commission Executive Secretary Karen Goff said the project

#### **Recovery Coach Project Receives National Awards**

Since Public Defender Services (PDS) began arranging for its own peer recovery coaches in West Virginia, the Public Defender Corporation Recovery Coach Project has been met with praise. The Recovery Coach Project originally began with grant money obtained by PDS but was provided sustained state funding following its success. Recently, this PDS program received national attention and awards for its service efforts.

The Clara Shortridge Foltz Award is co-sponsored by the National Legal Aid and Defender Association and the American Bar Association's committee on Legal Aid and Indigent Defense. Established in 1985, this award "commends a public defender program or defense delivery system for outstanding achievement in the provision of indigent defense services."

The Public Defender Corporation Recovery Coach Project was also selected as one of nine Rural Innovation Sites by the Rural Justice Collaborative (RJC). As part of this recognition, the RJC will work with the project during the next three years to create educational materials for an online resource center. Additional funding from the State Justice Institute will allow for visits to community leaders and participation in regional conferences.

"Rural community leaders often don't have the resources to develop programs from scratch, but we know that many rural justice leaders, like those from the Public Defender Corporation Recovery Coach Project, have found innovative solutions to their complex problems," said Rulo Strategies Executive Director Tara Kunkel. Rulo Strategies partnered with the National Center for State Courts to create the RJC. "Before this, there has been no nationally concerted effort for justice leaders and their collaborators in other sectors to share what they know. The Innovation Sites provide a framework that others can build from."

Congratulations to PDS and the recovery coaches of the Public Defender Corporation Recovery Coach Project for receiving these national recognitions.

### Consolidated Public Retirement Board Recognized for Outstanding Achievement in Financial Reporting

The Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) has received the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Award for Outstanding Achievement in Popular Annual Financial Reporting (PAFR).

The award represents a significant achievement for CPRB.



To be eligible for the PAFR award, a government must also submit its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report to GFOA's Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting Program and receive the Certificate for the current fiscal year. Each eligible report is reviewed by judges who evaluate the report based on the following categories: reader appeal, understandability, distribution methods, creativity, and other elements.

"I believe that it is important the CPRB issues a (PAFR) to effectively communicate financial results, fiduciary net position, and funding status for each of the 10 retirement systems administered by the CPRB, and to do so in a concise and understandable format," said CPRB Chief Financial Officer John D. Galloway.

#### Beautiful Christmas Trees on Display at West Virginia State Capitol Ahead of Joyful Night Celebration

Each year, the state of West Virginia displays two beautifully decorated Christmas trees on the Capitol campus for the holiday season, thanks to generous donations from West Virginia residents. This year, Helen Herring from Elkview donated a tree for the second time, an 18-yearold Frasier Fir, while the Buchanan family from Hansford donated a Blue Spruce tree in honor of their late daughter, Andrea, who passed away in 2009 at age 17.

The Frasier Fir, which can be seen in the North Plaza of the Capitol grounds, was planted by John Armstrong of French Creek Farms as a replacement for a previous tree that was always decorated for the holidays. When that tree grew too large, it was donated to the Capitol grounds in 2010. It was always the family's intention to donate the current Frasier Fir when it also became too large.

"We are honored to have it on display at our state Capitol," said Herring.

The Blue Spruce can be seen on the Lincoln Plaza on the south side of the Capitol building.

The Buchanans planted their tree ap-

proximately 25 years ago at their residence in eastern Kanawha County after Michael, a state employee for more than 36 years and currently a director in the West Virginia State Treasurer's Office, received it from the Division of Forestry as part of State Employee Appreciation Week. He planted it on his property with his daughter Andrea and her mother Tracy, who was pregnant with their son, Alex, at the time. The tree has always been known as Andrea's Tree.



"My family and I are very honored to have Andrea's tree displayed at the Capitol for this holiday season," said Buchanan. "It has been decorated



many times over the years, and I'm looking forward to seeing it shine in all its glory. I know Andrea will be looking down and smiling from the heavens!"

Each December, two trees adorn the Capitol Campus as part of the holiday season. This year's trees were donated by Helen Herring of Elkview, and the Buchanan family from Hansford in honor of Michael Buchanan's late daughter, Andrea (pictured above).

The decorated trees will be featured during the upcoming virtual Joyful Night Celebration. Information about this event will be released by the Governor's Office.

is another example of the Library Commission's commitment to providing access to information to every West Virginian. That access now requires robust broadband to support library operations and connect people to digital formats. "It would not have been possible without specialized knowledge and cooperation on many levels," Goff said.

The Library Commission led the efforts to coordinate the project, which was completed in multiple phases, beginning with the pre-solicitation work to draft adequate specifications and a scope of work. The WVOT was heavily involved in preparing the specifications, and in some cases, the libraries were in rural locations that did not have adequate broadband services, making that challenge even greater. Even before this project, all public libraries had internet service. Although adequate at one time, a creative approach to match capacity with demand was needed.

Upon award, five pilot locations for the proof of concept were selected, and following successful installation and testing, work began on the other sites by April 2021. With assistance from WVOT's networking and field staff, the project was completed in three months.

The vendor (Frontier Communications), in conjunction with the SLN and WVOT, assessed each site, prepared it for enhanced fiber installation, delivered the circuit to each location, and installed the necessary cables.

"This is an excellent example of inter-agency cooperation leading to significant improvements in technology," said WVOT Chief Information Officer Josh Spence. "We live in a digital world, and we must continue to place importance on leveraging technology effectively and efficiently."

The partnership between the Library Commission and the WVOT to provide enterprise technology services has already resulted in cost savings and improved support, since much of the work can be done in house. The completion of this project laid the groundwork for future projects to improve the services provided to citizens at libraries across the state.

"We are proud to be a part of such a significant achievement in making broadband enhancements to the State Library Network," said West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History Curator Randall Reid-Smith. "I consider it a great accomplishment anytime we can provide services that will benefit the people of West Virginia. Our partnership with the Office of Technology will allow us to continue that success in the future."

The next phase of this project will involve extending new information technology services and improved cybersecurity.

# Office of Technology Employee Showcases Cooking Talent on The Rachael Ray Show

He then sent that book to Ray, along with a personal note of encouragement.

"I wanted to send her something since I'm such a fan. I wasn't expecting a response," Lore said. The response first came in the form of a flower arrangement left at his door with a "thank you" note. That was soon followed by a letter from Ray inviting him to the show.

It was a quick 24-hour experience for Lore. He flew to New York City at 4 p.m. on Oct. 20, 2021, and back home the following afternoon after filming the show. Lore wasn't allowed to say anything about it until Nov. 5, 2021.

"I'm a private person at work. Lots of people didn't even know I like to cook, and this whole thing was out of my comfort zone," Lore said.

Lore's comfort zone may need to be expanded since Ray invited him back to the show.

"She gave me homework. She wants me to make something of my own then come back to the show and cook it with her," he said. "I have some ideas and would like to somehow incorporate West Virginia themes into what I cook."

A date for Lore's return to The Rachael Ray Show hasn't been scheduled. In the meantime, he has fond memories of his first visit.

#### United Way Encouraging Payroll Deductions as COVID-19 Pandemic Continues

West Virginia's United Way locations continue to provide services and assistance to the most vulnerable citizens affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

United Way has always connected individuals and families with food, health care services, transportation, utility and eviction prevention, and more. The pandemic has expanded their work and the need for the services they provide. During Fiscal Year 2021, nearly 90,000 people were fed by staff and volunteers. Additionally, the United Way distributed more than 123,000 shelf stable meals that were taken home. More than 600 families who were affected by the pandemic were able to keep utilities on due to grant funding, and 380 adults and 75 children moved from the streets into safe and secure housing.

"For so many families, the impact of the pandemic continues to be felt. Even one dollar a week can help so many in need," said Administration Cabinet Secretary Mark D. Scott.

State employees have generously supported the United Ways across West Virginia by donating through payroll deduction. The deadline to donate through payroll deduction for the upcoming year is Dec. 10, 2021.
