Thompson's Story is One of Redemption, Achievement



Mallory Thompson October Employee of the Month

Mallory Thompson, coordinator of programs for Public Defender Services (PDS), has been selected as the Department of Administration's *Employee of the Month* for October.

A state employee for almost two years, Thompson began her work with PDS in January 2022 as the Title IV-E coordinator before becoming coordinator of programs in May 2022. In this role, she oversees several programs including the Recovery Coach Program, Parent Representative Navigator Program, SWIFT Defense Social Worker, and the VISTA Program. She also oversees the grant that holds Youth Defense Training sessions. In addition, Thompson oversees the creation and production of training sessions, grant opportunities, and the annual conference.

"Mallory is a heartwarming and motivating story of redemption and achievement," said

the co-worker who nominated her. "She suffered from a substance use disorder that disrupted her life and her family for a time. But she dedicated herself to recovery and to improving her life. Mallory was one of the first graduates from the Boone County drug court. In one year, Mallory has built the Parental Response Navigator program which provides staff to public defender corporations to assist clients who are involved in child abuse and neglect proceedings."

When she's not working, Thompson enjoys spending time with her husband and son, going on vacation, being outside, and working in her garden and flower bed.

Thompson will be joined by friends and coworkers at a special ceremony presented by Cabinet Secretary Mark D. Scott on Monday, Oct. 30, 2023, at 11 a.m. at the PDS offices.



CPRB Shares Information and Resources for State Employees Planning for Retirement

As many state government employees prepare to retire soon, the Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) would like to share a few reminders about what those individuals can expect during the retirement process and after retirement.

Individuals should allow adequate time for CPRB to process their retirement paperwork as the process can take anywhere from six to eight weeks. For those who are considering retirement soon, there are some requirements necessary to start the process. First, they are encouraged to request a Benefit Estimate at least six months prior to the date they



wish to retire. This will allow adequate time for proper retirement planning. For help with the planning process, prospective retirees can call CPRB at 304-558-3570 to schedule either an in-person or phone appointment.

Once the individual nears the retirement date, the retiree must submit all retirement forms filled out completely and correctly. Upon receipt of the completed retirement packet, the employer will be notified of the individual's intention to retire. Once the individual terminates employment, the employer can complete the required employer certification and report final salary and service to CPRB. Upon receipt of the employer certification, CPRB will be able to process the final retirement calculation.

Once retirees receive their first payment, they can sign up for the Retiree Self-Service (RSS) to obtain information about their benefits and make transactions 24 hours a day. Examples of the services available via the RSS include viewing the monthly pay statement a couple of days prior to payment receipt as well as printing annual 1099-R tax documents.

WVOT Urges Employees to 'Secure Our World'

2023 marks the 20th anniversary of Cybersecurity Awareness Month. As part of this anniversary celebration, the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) and the National Cybersecurity Alliance (NCA), working together to organize Cybersecurity Awareness Month, have launched an ongoing theme tilted "Secure Our World."

As part of the "Secure Our World" theme, CISA and NCA hope to encourage everyone to strengthen and adopt new cyber-security habits throughout each year. The four areas that state and federal partners are focusing on this month include:

- Using strong passwords and a password manager
- Turning on multifactor authentication (MFA)
- Recognizing and reporting phishing

Updating software

Since 2004, Cybersecurity Awareness Month has been held each October as a collaborative initiative between government and private industry to raise awareness about digital security and to empower everyone to protect their personal data from digital forms of crime.

As an individual employee and digital user, you are encouraged to take basic steps to protect your online information and privacy through constant education from trusted partners, like Stay Safe Online, at https://staysafeonline.org/category/online-safety-privacy-basics. No matter what role you play within an organization, you can still affect its cybersecurity.

Secure Our World: Cybersecurity Awareness Month Tips

Strengthen Your Password

- Longer is stronger: Passwords with at least 16 characters are hardest to crack.
- Hard to guess: Use a random string of mixed-case letters, numbers and symbols. If you need to memorize a password, create a memorable "passphrase" of 5 7 unrelated words. Get creative with spelling and/or add numbers or symbols.
- One of a kind: Use a unique password for each account.

<u>Turn on Multifactor</u> Authentication (MFA)

- Open your app or account settings. It may be called Account Settings, Settings & Privacy, or similar.
- Turn on multifactor authentication/two-factor authentication.
- Select an MFA method to use from the options provided, such as receiving a code by text or email or using facial recognition or fingerprints to confirm your identity.

Recognizing and Reporting Phishing

- Recognize: Look for common signs such as urgent or alarming language; requests to send personal and financial information; misspellings or unusual language; and incorrect email addresses, domain names, or links (e.g. amazan.com).
- Report: If phishing is suspected, report it to protect yourself and others.
- Remove: Delete the message. Don't reply or click on any attachments or links.

Update Your Software

- While devices and applications will usually notify you when the latest software updates become available, it is important to check periodically as well.
- Install ALL updates, especially those dealing with sensitive information.
- Install updates as soon as possible. Attackers won't wait, and you shouldn't either!
- Turn on automatic updates.

Clothes Closet Created at Public Defender Services

When people are starting over after a troubled time in their lives, often something as simple as a new outfit can make a big difference.

There's now a clothing closet for clients of Public Defender Services (PDS). Mallory Thompson created the closet and said it's one less thing their clients need to worry about.

Thompson is coordinator of programs for PDS, through which she oversees several programs, including the Recovery Coach Program, Parent Representative Navigator (PRN) Program, SWIFT Defense Social Worker, and the VISTA Program.

"No matter if they need something appropriate for court, are released from

treatment or incarceration, or are just in need of clothing, we can now help them with those situations," Thompson said. "We have clothes and shoes available for our office and our Public Defender Corporation offices. We have let them know if they need specific things for their office or clients, to let us know and we will see what we have available. If we have what they need, then we send it to the office. There is no limit. If someone is in need of clothing or shoes and we can help, we will donate."

The closet is currently made up of items donated by PDS employees. Any Department of Administration employee who would like to donate can contact Thompson at *Mallory.G.Thompson@wv.gov* to make arrangements.

The clothing closet at PDS was created to assist people needing items for court and for individuals recently released from treatment or incarceration.

Fall Leaves Inspiring for State Park Travel

A fully functional replica of the original Cooper's Mill, this attraction will only be open on the weekends after Labor Day with the last public tour day on Oct. 29, 2023. In addition to the tours, it is a popular photography spot.

Babcock State Park is also part of the West Virginia Waterfall Trail. Several of these waterfalls are accessible right from the Grist Mill parking lot if you do not want a long hike. For more information on the West Virginia Waterfall Trail, visit www.wvtourism.com/west-virginia-waterfall-trail.

In addition to hiking to see waterfalls, Babcock is home to more than 20 miles of trails, including easy loops and challenging climbs. Babcock's Skyline Trail follows a natural cliff line to spectacular vistas while the Lake View Trail loop around Boley Lake is a short one mile.

they're being utilized in different parts of the state," McGinn said. "The end goal of the program is to have a functioning database of programs throughout the state, as well as producing a report for policymakers and educational programs for judges and attorneys."

McGinn plans to go to law school after his year with PDS and ultimately wants to become a public defender.

Members of the VISTA program serve full time for one year. Members help nonprofit organizations and public agencies more effectively generate the commitment of private sector resources, encourage volunteer service at the local level, and empower individuals and communities. VISTA members support an organization to make sustainable change in areas that affect poverty, including education, public health, climate, access to benefits, and more.

PDS partnered with the National Legal Aid and Defense Association (NLADA), which contracts with the National Service Corporation, for the VISTA member. NLADA pays the stipend and other expenses of the VISTA member. PDS pays an administrative fee to NLADA and receives the year of service from the VISTA member.
