Shelly Ellis, a Human Resources Specialist 1 for the Division of Personnel (DOP), has been selected as the Department of Administration's *Employee of the Month* for February.

A state employee for nearly two years, Ellis' duties include rating and evaluating applicants' qualifications, such as education and experience, for various job titles. She also writes and posts Public Service Announcements

on the DOP's "Job Opportunities" webpage as well as counsels applicants who need assistance with the application process.

"She's a very dependable and hard worker who volunteers to help others when they're backed up. There are days she's running around like a chicken with its head cut off," said the coworker who nominated her. "Even when she's not feeling well, she gives 100%. She's the first to check on a sick co-worker and offer help any way she can."

When she's not working, Ellis enjoys volunteering with the Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts, serving as administrator for her neighborhood watch program, and helping organize the St. Albans Veterans' Day Parade each year. She also likes playing board games and spending time with her eight children and one grandchild, and is expecting another grandchild in July.

Gov. Jim Justice Delivers State of the State Address

Gov. Jim Justice delivered his second State of the State Address at the State Capitol on January 10, 2018, during which he focused on the state's financial turnaround in the last 12 months. As he did last year, he spoke without the assistance of a teleprompter and used whiteboards to convey his message.

Gov. Justice's proposal called for increasing the budget for tourism to \$20 million, developing a program in which high school students can earn associate's degrees, offering free community and

The 2017-2018 West Virginia State Employees Combined Campaign (WV-SECC), in conjunction with the United Way, is wrapping up another successful year.

Tammie Means of the West Virginia Office of Technology spearheaded the campaign for the Department of Administration this year, with the valuable assistance of each agency coordinator. She said agencies came up with different projects to raise money while having a little fun at the same time.

"Some of the smaller agencies went in together with larger agencies to make a bigger impact," she said. "They sold pepperoni rolls, offered spaghetti dinners, conducted bake-offs and chili cook-offs, played games, and coordinated silent auctions. lists while getting their photos taken. The agency also sold cookies, hot chocolate, and "reindeer food" during the event. The event raised \$317 with plans to make it even better next year by moving it to the Capitol Complex.

"It was truly a team effort by our staff members and it all came together just as we had hoped. It brought everyone so much joy just watching the kids interacting with Santa. There's nothing better than seeing a child's eyes light up when they see Santa up close," said Betsy Chapman, who coordinated the event. BRIM to Review Department of Administration Agencies' Continuity of Operations Plans

For state agencies that are responsible for hundreds of employees and thousands of constituents, preparing for emergencies involves a lot more than fire drills and knowing the location of emergency exits. Agency officials also need to think about their technology needs in the event employees are displaced.

Department of Administration agencies are working with the Board of Risk and Insurance Management (BRIM) to update their Continuity of Operations Plans (COOP) and are being advised to consider technology needs. BRIM is currently reviewing all Department of Administration COOPs to determine what, if anything, the agencies overlooked when planning. Examples might include remote computer network access or mobile communication centers.

"Disasters can affect the ability of agencies to communicate both internally and externally by damaging and overloading systems and equipment," said Mary Jane Pickens, executive director of BRIM and deputy secretary of the Department of Administration. "Technical support is vital to protecting life and property and ensuring that our agencies can continue to perform essential functions during emergencies."

Each Department of Administration agency has its own COOP outlining its response in the event an emergency affects that agency, while the Secretary of Administration's COOP will provide guidance at the Department level when an event affects some or all of its agencies.

The Department of Administration encourages all employees to be aware of their agency's COOP and what actions should be taken in the case of an emergency.

State Agency Spotlight: Real Estate Division Handles Leasing Offices, Parking Issues and Space Management

Whenever an employee of the Department of Administration comes to work at a building, parks his or her car, and sits at his or her desk, chances are good the Real Estate Division played a role in making all of that happen.

The mission of the Real Estate Division is to lease office space for state agencies and maintain a centralized statewide resource for proactive space management and planning. This helps its client agencies to operate optimally in the best office and workspace possible. The agency also coordinates parking at the Capitol Complex and enforces parking regulations.

"For a small office, we have a big impact," said Jon Amores, executive director of the Real Estate Division. "Like our fellow Department of Administration agencies, we tend to work more behind the scenes but play an important part in the smooth functioning of government operations. Our staff is focused and experienced in doing their jobs so our fellow state employees can do theirs."

In 2017, the Division continued the effective administration of 627 leases around the state and approximately 200 lease renewals, totaling \$57 million. "In addition to finding good office space, we have to be mindful of costs. The Division makes sure that the lease payments



While the Real Estate Division only employs 18 individuals, the agency handles a plethora of responsibilities for the state, including leasing offices, managing office space, and overseeing parking on the Capitol campus. According to Director Jon Amores, the agency plays an important role in the function of government operations. One of their greatest achievements recently has been relocating many state agency tenants into the newly renovated Building 3. *Mission Statement:* To maintain an effective and centralized statewide resource for proactive space management and planning, helping its client agencies to operate optimally in the best office and workspace possible.

agencies make are consistent with market rates, and rent increases are aggressively managed," said Amores.

The Division also met the challenge of relocating state agency tenants into the newly renovated Building 3, as well as managing major disruptions in parking due to the construction. The Division's Parking Section effectively monitors 2,589 parking spaces on 21 lots around the Capitol Complex and leases 2,297 parking spaces to employees.

Fleet Offers Rental Vehicles for State Agency Use

Agencies are reminded that the Fleet Management Office (FMO) has 10 vehicles available for state agencies to rent in an effort to get more usage out of the state's fleet.

Agencies are encouraged to consider using a Fleet vehicle before a rental or personal vehicles. To assist in determining which option may be most cost effective, the Purchasing Division has a calculator available on its website at *www.state.wv.us/admin/ purchase/travel/rental.html*.

Both short- and long-term rentals are available.

"The cost of our rentals includes gas and unlimited mileage, so after you factor in those costs, it benefits agencies to use our vehicles," said Fleet Manager Mandy Parsons. "We have a variety of vehicles to meet the agencies' needs and the process to reserve a vehicle is easy."

To make a reservation, go to *www. fleet.wv.gov* and click on the "Rentals" tab. At the bottom of the page, open the Daily Use Vehicle Reservation Request (DOA-FM-003) form, complete it, and submit it via email to *fleet@wv.gov*.

Driving in a Winter Wonderland with Traction Control

While vehicle advertisements often focus on traction control, many drivers do not understand what their vehicle's traction control system really does. The Fleet Management Office explains that this feature, which engages only when the wheels start to slip, helps make driving smoother and also helps drivers maintain control on icy or wet roads.

Traction control has greatly improved with modern computer-operated systems. These complex systems work to reduce the potential of tire spin and give drivers increased stability. With winter weather and wet conditions common during this season, having good traction control reduces the risk of sliding or spinning your vehicle.

While traction control is beneficial when accelerating or driving uphill, this feature should be turned off when a vehicle is stuck in deep snow or mud.



If you apply snow chains to your vehicle, this feature should also be turned off for safety and better performance.

Many modern vehicles contain a traction control system which helps drivers handle slippery conditions. When traveling through snow and rain, this feature will offer better performance for your vehicle. As seen on the left, this system can be turned off and is visible on the vehicle's dashboard.

New Cards Issued to State Employees by Fleet's ARI Contract for Fuel Needs, Effective January 1, 2018

Drivers of state vehicles should now be using new cards for their fuel needs.

The Fleet Management Office (FMO) contracted with ARI to provide both maintenance and fuel for state fleet vehicles. The previously used WEX cards were automatically terminated on December 31, 2017.

ARI is the world's largest privately held fleet management company. ARI's fuel management program is designed to provide the tools, resources, and expertise to help organizations get a better handle on their fleet's fuel expenses. Because fuel prices can create uncertainty in managing an annual budget, ARI's fuel program is meant to help monitor and manage fuel related expenses. ARI captures all the data associated with fuel use and begins to carefully watch for trends and areas for possible improvement. The fuel management team actively monitors fuel transactions, looking for opportunities to improve miles per gallon and reduce cost per gallon. They work closely with FMO, providing monthly reports to deter abuse and maximize efficiencies. ARI's fleet maintenance program allows ARI's technicians to negotiate better savings by flexing their buying power and national account alliances on behalf of its fleet customers and identify issues with more precision so fleet vehicles stay running and on the road.

"The ability to provide both maintenance and fuel transactional data with one vendor is a tremendous accomplishment for the Fleet Management Office," said Fleet Manager Mandy Parsons. The Purchasing Division authorized ARI to access tires at the statewide contract rate to serve all agencies.

"Over the last 12 months, FMO has provided fleet coordinators with a more complete picture of their fleet's operating cost. Fleet coordinators will no longer have to check several sources and combined data to determine a vehicle's operating cost," she continued. "This move to one vendor also saves the state of West Virginia money by eliminating the interface fees associated with combining the data of two vendors and provides the state the ability to capture the total basis point rebate offered. Before, the state had to pay within 30 days to receive the vendor rebate. In addition, the total fuel rebate goes straight to the agency acquiring and paying for the fuel."

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technical college educations for qualifying students, and eliminating the tax on manufacturing machinery and equipment and manufacturing inventory.

The Governor's proposed budget also included a one percent pay raise for all state employees this year and next, as well as a five percent pay raise for teachers that would come in one percent increments over the next five years.

Throughout his address, Gov. Justice discussed ongoing efforts to deal with the opioid crisis and the need to get more coal miners back to work. He thanked voters for passing the road bond referendum that helped set the state on a positive path.

"I was your coach. I was a coach that maybe got the players running in the same direction," Gov. Justice said. "Maybe got the passion going the right way. Did it for the right reason. Didn't do it to please a party or didn't do it to gain status or something for myself.



Did it because I love you. I really, truly do. I didn't do it because you were union or nonunion, or rich or poor, or black or white. I didn't do it because you were Dems or Republicans. I did it because you're West Virginians. And I think with all of my soul, if I was able to give you anything, it was just that. The ability to maybe be your coach. To maybe be what a governor is really supposed to be." While Gov. Justice discussed many serious problems facing West Virginia during his Address, he also had a smile on his face at times. Mimicking last year's silver platter, Justice presented special gifts to the leaders of the House and Senate but with a positive spin. They included Hershey's Kisses and boutonnieres.

Gov. Justice also delivered silver platters with giant Hershey's Kisses, boutonnieres, and an eight-track version of "Happy Days" to the leaders of the House and Senate.
