When he is not working, Hall enjoys spending time with his family, going to ballgames, fishing, hunting, and doing anything outdoors.


Hall will be recognized by Cabinet Secretary Allan McVey in a private ceremony on May 11, 2021, at 3 p.m. in Building 15.

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## State Capitol's Lincoln Plaza Reopens After Months-Long Hardscape Project, Adorned with Array of Flowers

After a three-month long project to repair and restore the Lincoln Plaza hardscape on the capitol campus, the plaza reopened to the public on April 1, 2021, ahead of schedule. Two flower beds adorned with tulips, pansies, and other vibrant flowers now frame the common area, showcasing the campus' natural and historic beauty just in time for warmer weather. An additional 16 flower beds can be found around the campus.

"Similar to the dome's water intrusion project, this project was necessary both structurally and to preserve the historic beauty of this public space," said Department of Administration Cabinet Secretary Allan McVey. "Safety is always our number one concern, so it was imperative to ensure visitors aren't met with crumbling concrete and that water isn't standing unnecessarily around the property and its main structure, leading to other potential future issues."

The contract for the Lincoln Plaza restoration was awarded to Persinger and Associates with a Notice to Proceed issued on June 15, 2020. Persinger Inc. performed all civil work such as the new concrete ADA ramp with bronze handrails and the new concrete landing and sidewalk along Kanawha Boulevard. The company's

subcontractor, Wilson Restoration, performed the historic restoration work of replacing, repairing and/or resetting limestone that had been damaged by years of freeze/thaw cycles. Wilson also repointed the mortar in all of the brick at the Lincoln Statue level and applied new seam sealant throughout.

As part of this project, the General Services Division (GSD) worked with Persinger and Associates, Inc., to repair, restore, and/or replace the limestone steps, pavers, and fountains on the plaza; remove and replace the existing accessible concrete ramp; clean the existing drainage system and fit the landing drainage system with new covers; repoint the landing area brick and stone medallions for historic preservation; and more.

"Overall, the project went well with only minor problems encountered due to weather-related incidences such as rain, ice, and snow," said Mark Crites, building project manager with GSD.

Crites said there were a few underlying issues with existing conditions that needed corrected, such as retrofitting additional limestone steps and pavers that had deteriorated beneath the surface as well as replacing the existing rusted slot drains with stainless steel to allow proper water runoff and longevity of the Plaza. New drain line and supply valves were installed at the existing fountains, which were also relined with a heavy epoxy coating for durability.

"The COVID-19 pandemic caused us to rethink our methods for meetings and site visits but cost little of our time and effort on the project," Crites said. "The progress meetings were conducted by video conference, and social distancing was maintained during site visits."

As we move into the warmer months, despite the main capitol still being closed to visitors, state residents and out-of-state visitors alike are encouraged to visit the capitol campus and take in the charming landscape. According to GSD Grounds Manager John Cummings, the grounds crew planted 47,000 tulips on the campus this year. Those, in addition to 5,000 pansies, had the campus blooming from March to May. The GSD grounds crew will plant an additional 37,000 summer annuals and place 100 hanging baskets around the grounds.

During the growing season, the flowers will be continuously watered, unwanted plants and weeds removed, and watersoluble/foliar fertilizer appropriated, as necessary.



said Sheryl Webb, director of the Division of Personnel. "There are all kinds of workplace questions related to the vaccine."

Webb said some employees have asked if the vaccine is mandatory (no), and some managers have wondered if they can ask employees if they have had the vaccine or plan to get it (yes).

Uncertainty and misinformation can make things difficult for employers and employees.

"We tried to address issues and common questions," Webb said. "There are so many unknowns, such as how to navigate through everything and where to get information."

The FAQ list may not cover everything an employee needs to know. Questions can be directed to the Employee Relations section of the agency at 304.414.1853.

"We're trying to give guidelines to go by," Webb said.

The purpose of the document is to provide assistance to agencies and employees regarding COVID-19 human resource management policies and practices that impact agencies, workers, and their families related to COVID-19 vaccination and the workplace. Agencies are encouraged to follow the guidelines issued by state, federal, and local health officials to help prevent workplace exposures to COVID-19. ## **Funding for Two CPRB Retirement Plans Increases**

Despite the many repercussions the economy has experienced during the last year due to the pandemic, the Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) is pleased to share that funding percentages of the state's two largest retirement plans, Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) and Teachers' Retirement System (TRS), have increased. PERS is now funded at 95% and TRS is funded at 72.8%. PERS is among the best funded public pension plans in the country and TRS is funded at its highest level in CPRB's history. It was funded at 9% in 1991.

"West Virginia is an example to other states on how to properly fund public pension plans," said Director Jeff Fleck. "Our success is a testament to the vision and dedication of current and past legislatures and governors who have committed to properly fund our plans."

A fully funded pension plan is one that has sufficient assets to provide for all the accrued benefits it owes and can therefore meet its future obligations. To be fully funded, the plan must be able to make all the anticipated payments to both current and prospective pensioners.

PERS was established on July 1, 1961, to provide retirement benefits for employees of the state and other political subdivisions. PERS has approximately 35,781 active members and approximately 28,450 retirees receiving annuity benefits. PERS is funded by employee and employer contributions that are annually



reviewed to ensure that they result in sound funding for the plan.

TRS was established on July 1, 1941, to provide retirement benefits for teachers and school service personnel. TRS currently has approximately 34,753 members and 36,797 retirees receiving annuity benefits.

## State Uses NeoGov to Streamline Job Postings

The Division of Personnel (DOP) is working to streamline the job posting process along with the rest of the hiring process.

The state is moving the job posting process to NeoGov, which is the web-based application the state already uses for applicant tracking.

"We've been using a mainframe system for years – the Human Resource Information System, or HRIS, for job postings," said Director Sheryl Webb. "The process starts in HRIS and ends in NeoGov, but with this change, the entire process will be in NeoGov."

The DOP will contact agencies to conduct training. Webb said the office kicked off training with the Division of Natural Resources last month.

"We hope to have the transition finished by the end of this summer," Webb said.
