PEIA Delivers Health Care to Public Employees

Editor's Note: This is part of an on-going series of articles which takes a closer look at Department of Administration agencies.

It goes without saying that health care has been, and continues to be, a primary focus of attention for so many people. Currently, one of the most pressing issues in the country is the issue of affordable health care.

Many complexities have always been associated with health care and for thousands of state employees and retirees, the numerous intricacies are handled by their provider, the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA), which was created under the Public Employees Insurance Act of 1971.

Today, more than 50 full-time PEIA employees are responsible for a multitude of programs for its members,

ranging from administration of insurance programs to wellness and outreach programs.

The sections within PEIA and their primary responsibilities are noted below:

- **Finance:** Billing, collections, accounts receivables, rate setting, plan analysis, Other Post Employment Benefit management, reporting, and auditing;
- Member services: Member inquiries, phone calls, and outreach;
- Eligibility: Enrollment, membership reconciliation with vendors, member changes, and auditing;
- **Provider relations:** Quality, physician outreach, new program design, manage the capitation pro-

Kudos to several Department of Administration employees who recently earned national certification in their respective fields.

The Purchasing Division recently congratulated several staff members who earned national credentials through the Universal Public Procurement Certification Council (UPPCC). Assistant Purchasing Director Mike Sheets and Senior Buyers Tara Lyle and Frank Whittaker received their Certified Professional Public Buyer (CPPB) certification for successfully completing the organization's examination in May. This national certification includes an application process, formal education training, work-related training, public purchasing experience and functional management experience. Purchasing Director Dave Tincher and Buyer Supervisors Roberta Wagner and Krista Ferrell previously earned their CPPO and Buyer Supervisor Shelly Murray earned her CPPB national certification through the UPPCC.

Additionally, Cliff Manns of the Office of Technology recently has passed the Certified Information Systems Security Professional (CISSP) examination in June. Mann's preparation paid off as less than eight percent of those tested achieve scores higher than the 85 percent and 81 percent of examinees fail on their first attempt. Manns exceeded both of those benchmarks.

The new website for the Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) added

The West Virginia Office of Technology's Office of Information Security and Controls is sponsoring a no-charge information and cyber security awareness event on Oct. 2 at the Charleston Civic Center. This year's theme is "How Much are You Willing to Lose?"

The agenda is a mixture of informational sessions, with free posters, calendars, bookmarks, and other security-

themed items. The event is open to the public, though registration priority will be given to public sector officials and employees.

The event will feature presentations delivered by experts in the areas of cyber threats, effective practices to safeguard

State Employees' Children to Qualify for the WVCHIP



Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin recently announced, pending federal approval, dependents of West Virginia state government employees will be eligible to apply for health insurance coverage with the West Virginia Children's Health Insurance Program (WVCHIP). Previously, these individuals were not eligible to apply for WVCHIP due to the federal program's eligibility restrictions.

"The good health of our children is of the utmost importance," Gov. Tomblin said. "Through this opportunity, we are seeking to protect and improve our children's quality of life and future by providing a more affordable insurance option for their families."

On September 1, 2013, WVCHIP will notify the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) of its intent to submit an amended state plan authorizing enrollment of public employees' children into WVCHIP. The CMS approval process is anticipated to begin in October with authorization anticipated by January 1, 2014. If approved, eligible PEIA members can explore this new option during open enrollment with WVCHIP coverage to begin July 1, 2014.

The Affordable Care Act changed federal CHIP eligibility requirements enabling WVCHIP to consider enrolling qualified dependents of state employees, who currently receive coverage under the Public Employees Insurance Agency. If approved by CMS, the WVCHIP insurance would offer more affordable coverage and enhanced benefited for qualified children of state employees.

State Inventory Coordinators Reminded of Opportunity to Reconcile Agency Assets

The West Virginia State Agency for Surplus Property (WVSASP) reminds procurement officers of the opportunity to reconcile all of their agency's fixed assets in preparation of the conversion to the state's Enterprise Resource Planning System, wvOASIS. This reconciliation includes items that have been previously listed as lost.

Corrective measures which agencies may perform until October 31 are listed below:

Retire lost fixed assets to WVFIMS with a Fixed Asset Reconciliation Approval Statement (form WV-100), which must be signed by the agency director and agency Cabinet Secretary (please note this form is located on the WVSASP website at www.wvsurpls.gov/forms/WV100InventoryTemplate.pdf;

- Indentify fixed assets with corrective information using a Data Change Request form, and;
- Provide the option to remove fixed assets below the program's guidelines. This is property with an original value of \$1,000 or more; computers and laptops with an original value of \$500 or more; and all firearms, regardless of costs.

"This opportunity for agencies to reconcile its fixed assets is a one-time event," said Elizabeth Perdue, Assistant Purchasing Director and WVSASP Manager. "Agencies may begin submitting information to us now. It will be in everyone's best interest not to wait until the end of October."

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Bowgren said.

"We wanted to make the site simpler to use, so everyone could access information without any confusion," she said.

Cricket Reynolds, a secretary with the Public Employees Grievance Board, said that although much of the information remained the same on her agency's new website, it is now easier to navigate, especially the "search database by form" function.

"Every decision by the Grievance Board is in this database, and when you are searching for a decision, you can now list the criteria for the search," she said. "The resulting list gives a synopsis for each decision that matches the criteria. You can click the synopsis and then access the decision."

Reynolds said the new search function adds a step, but increases the information available to users. The new website incorporates a more visually appealing format that the previous site, she said.

"When the board's original site was developed, it was very basic, and the new site is much more interesting to look at, while still maintaining its functionality," she said.

Dana Eddy, executive director for Public Defender Services, said his agency's new website has updated and simplified access to forms for public defenders.

"Much of the website traffic tends to be legal counsel practicing throughout the state, and the site redesign makes it easier for them to find information and to fill out vouchers for reimbursement," he said. "We created an online system where counsel can prepare their vouchers and the system does all of the mathematical calculations to help eliminate error. We can then use it for statistical information."

Eddy said the site also makes it easier for the average citizen to navigate. "Information about the agency is set out in a more readily accessible fashion, and people can understand the mission of the agency."

With the never-ending advance of technology, the new websites demonstrate the continuing mission of agencies to offer greater service to their customers and the state of West Virginia.

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Ethics Act prohibits and allows, and the Ethic Act's goals.

"The general principle is to maintain confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the governmental process," Parker said. "Citizens should ultimately feel that government is accountable."

Parker said the 2005 Special Session of the West Virginia Legislature extended the statute of limitations to two years on ethics violations, and amended the complaint process and procedure to allow more time to investigate ethics violation allegations. "This gives us more opportunity to thoroughly investigate allegations and to fulfill the agency mission," she said.

During the training session, Parker discussed various parts of the Ethics Act, including public contracts, nepotism, and the rules on receiving gifts and honorariums. She said that much of agency's advice is by telephone, when individuals call with potential ethical issues. She said the Ethics Commission is authorized by statute to give binding legal advice, and all calls are kept anonymous, though rulings are made public record.

Parker said the public issuance of advisory opinions ensures that residents understand fully that government officials and public servants alike are behaving in a just and legal manner. "An educated citizenry keeps politicians accountable," she said.

Parker said more workshops are planned throughout the state, with the goal of ensuring that public servants and public officials have the best access to information.
