When he's not working, Pinkerton enjoys being with his family, listening to music (especially jazz), and watching the news and weather.



The Fleet Management Division (FMD) has a small rental pool of state vehicles, including vans, medium and large sedans, and SUVs available to state agencies for daily or long-term rental. The table below shows a sample of FMD's rental selection.

Mileage and gas usage are no longer included in the price. The FMD also no longer offers the West Virginia Parkways E-Z Pass® transponders.

A mileage calculator found online at *www.state.wv.us/ admin/purchase/travel/rental.html* helps the user establish whether renting a vehicle from FMD or Hertz/Enterprise is the most cost-effective option.

FleetCommander conveniently offers 24/7 access to the Capitol Complex Motor Pool. Through FleetCommander, individuals can make reservations, view their existing reservations, update their profile, and more. User profiles and

reservations are kept safely online for viewing at any time, which means quicker and easier access to the Capitol Complex Motor Pool. Keys for reservations can be picked up at the FleetCommander Kiosk located near the Capitol Complex Guard Shack on Piedmont Road.

Administration Agencies Receives Continued Recognition for Excellence in Financial Reports

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) of the United States and Canada has once again recognized Department of Administration agencies for excellence in financial reporting. The Consolidated Public Retirement Board (CPRB) and the Finance Division were recognized for their work for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

This is the 10th year CPRB has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting (CAFR) award and the 27th year for the Finance Division. The CAFR award is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a sig-

nificant accomplishment by a government and its management.

"Receiving recognition this means so much for the Department of Administration and the state as a whole," said Department of Administration Cabinet Secretary Mark Scott. "These comprehensive annual financial reports showcase the state's financial picture and forecast for future years, and this acknowledgement confirms that the internal financial controls and assurances that are in place within state government are working. The result is a high level of accountability and transparency to our citizens."

The GFOA is a major professional association servicing the needs of



nearly 19,000 appointed and elected local, state, and provincial-level government officials and other finance practitioners. Its CAFR award is judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program.

- <u>Be Informed</u>: Be aware of the different types of hazards that can affect your community. Be familiar with local alerts and warnings. Sign up to receive local, state, and federal emergency alerts. Contact your city or county's emergency management office to learn more.
- <u>Prepare for Disasters</u>: Limit the effects disasters have on you and your family. Document and insure your property. Check your insurance coverage. Safeguard



- critical documents and valuables. Learn how to make your home stronger in the face of storms and other common hazards, and act fast if you receive a local warning or alert.
- Make a Plan: Talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster.
- <u>Build a Kit</u>: Gather enough supplies to last for several days after a disaster for everyone in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly.
- Teach Youth About Preparedness: Talk to your kids about how to prepare for emergencies and what to do in case you are separated. Reassure them by providing information about how they can get involved.

Purchasing Division Hosts Annual Conference

The West Virginia Purchasing Division hosted its annual statewide Agency Purchasing Conference Aug. 23-26, 2022, at The Resort at Glade Springs in Daniels, W. Va. Nearly 200 state agency procurement officers attended the conference, the first in-person conference since 2019. An additional 100 state employees participated through the virtual option that was offered.

The conference was cancelled in 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It was held virtually in 2021.

The annual conference provides critical training to state agency purchasers on the laws and rules that govern the state purchasing process. During the conference, Administration Cabinet Secretary Mark D. Scott provided the keynote presentation.

Many valuable workshops were offered on this year's agenda, including those on agency delegated purchasing, statewide contracts, vendor registration, and surplus property. A new class this year, "Building High Engagement and a High Performance Culture," was presented by Hitomi Scott, senior manager at the Toyota Production System Support Center (TSSC), Inc. The Purchasing Division partnered with the TSSC and applied the Toyota Production System (TPS) culture of high engagement and high performance to improve speed of the requisition process to benefit agencies.

In addition to this year's workshops, Purchasing Director Mike Sheets recognized Morgan Sheets, fiscal supervisor for the West Virginia Veterans Home in Barboursville, as the 2022 Procurement Officer of the Year.

"This award will benefit me in my job by reminding me that procurement is an ever-evolving learning experience and whether changes be driven legislatively or by out of the ordinary market fluctuations, we all must be prepared to learn and implement new processes and procedures to lawfully and effectively achieve our procurement goals," said Sheets. "The award will also strengthen my resolve to keep working as a team, which makes all of our jobs easier and definitely more fulfilling!"

Watoga State Park a Perfect Spot for Starry Night Observation and Outdoor Recreation

As the largest of West Virginia's state parks, the more than 10,000 acres of Watoga State Park has something for everyone. Located in Marlinton, WV, Watoga State Park was originally designated as a state forest and as a wildlife and timber preserve before officially opening as a state park in 1937. Since then, it has become a popular destination for those looking for a quiet weekend away and those wanting a more adventurous experience.

With the name "Watoga" originating from the Cherokee word for "starry waters," it is no surprise that two features of the park are its stargazing and waterways. Watoga State Park was recognized by the International Dark-Sky Association as a Dark Sky Park in 2021. Amateur astronomers will want to take advantage of these clear skies to observe the celestial objects above.

Watoga Lake provides opportunities for boating, swimming, and fishing. The West Virginia Department of Natural Resources stocks a variety of fish each year at the park. Trout, catfish, and bluegill are among the many variety of fish you might catch in the 11-acre lake. With the Greenbrier River also flowing through the park, visitors have the opportunity for river fishing as well.

Featuring more than 40 miles of trails, Watoga State Park has hiking opportunities available for any level. A popular hiking destination is to the Ann Bailey Lookout Tower which rewards hikers with spectacular views. While the Arrowhead Trail provides a faster and steeper route, more casual hikers can take the longer and flatter Ann Bailey Trail to the lookout.
